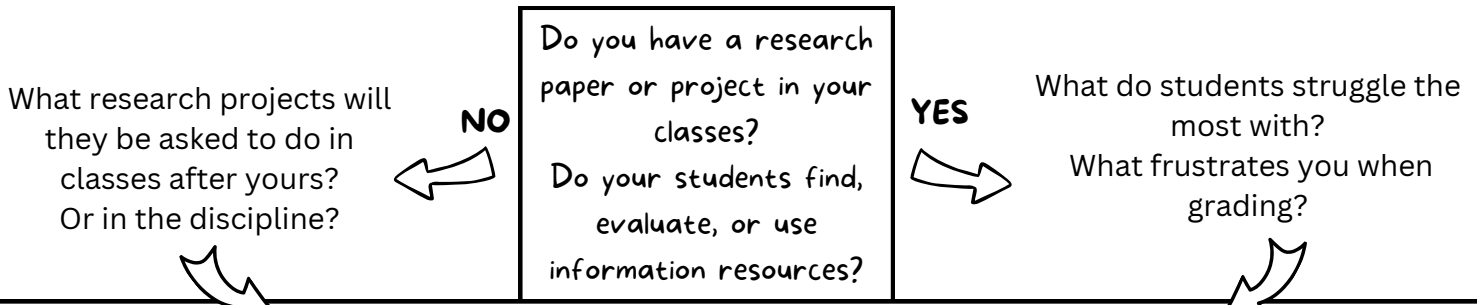



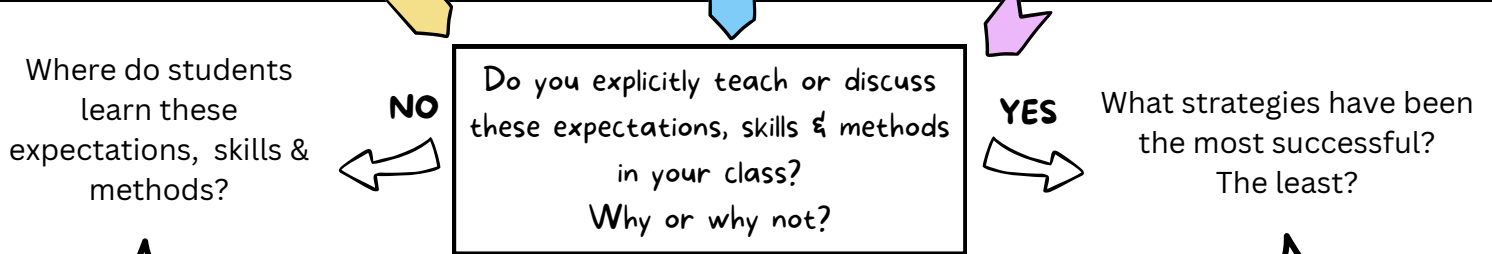


Information Literacy Discussion Prompts

<p>What types of information & sources are the most used in your discipline?</p> <p>e.g. primary, quantitative, case studies, news, opinion, peer-reviewed</p>	<p>What impact does fake news, dis- or mis-information, bias, satire, and/or opinion have on the information in your discipline?</p>	<p>How does your discipline share their ideas with each other? <p>What specialized collections are students expected to be able to search and use?</p> <p>e.g. libraries, databases, websites, data sets</p>	<p>What are the most important criteria for evaluating information in your discipline?</p> <p>e.g. currency, relevance, authority, publication types, bias</p>	<p>What deliverables are most often used in your discipline?</p> <p>e.g. reports, scholarly papers, presentations, critiques, lesson plans</p>
<p>What search strategies do students need for these collections?</p> <p>e.g. keyword searching, Boolean Operators, Subject Headings, Finding Aids, Citation tracing</p> <p>LEARN MORE </p>	<p>What method(s) are students expected to use when evaluating information?</p> <p>e.g. Lateral Reading, BEAM, CRAAP</p> <p>LEARN MORE </p>	<p>How are students expected to use information resources in these deliverables?</p> <p>e.g. summarize, synthesize, quote, extrapolate, critique</p>
